THINKING OF BUYING A HOME IN PARK CITY, UTAH?







WITH ITS HISTORIC MAIN STREET and mining-town roots, Park City still possesses a genuine Old West charm, despite the influx of development that started with the 2002 Winter Olympics and turned it into one of the country's preeminent mountain resorts. The 17.7-square-mile town, located at an elevation of 7,500 feet, is home to three major ski resorts: Park City, the Canyons, and Deer Valley. The area's authentic atmosphere, combined with luxury amenities, light and fluffy snow, and easy accessibility, has made it a desirable second-home destination for buyers across the country.

During the first half of 2008, the median sales price of a single-family home in Park City proper was \$1.9 million, a 14 percent increase compared to the prior year. However, in the more affordable outlying areas of Snyderville Basin, located seven miles north of Park City, and Kamas Valley, located 12 miles east of Park City, prices dropped 8 percent to \$700,000 and 5 percent to \$322,900, respectively.

Though the number of single-family-home sales in the greater Park City area for the first half of 2008 dropped 45 percent from the year before to 244 transactions, and condo sales fell 34 percent to 280 transactions, new developments from brands such as the Waldorf Astoria, St. Regis, and Montage are slated for completion in 2009 and 2010, and will surely raise interest in the area over the long term.

WHAT TO EXPLORE WHILE LOOKING FOR A HOME:

Stay: For those seeking more space than a hotel can offer, the 13,000-square-foot Casa Nova villa (shown above) offers four master suites, a wine cellar, a 15-seat home theater with THX-certified sound and a 133-inch screen, and 13 ski lockers with boot and glove warmers. Winter rates start at \$53,500 per week.
